Message by the Headmaster, Mr. John Martin



A Mescage from the Founder of the School, Dr. A. C. Stanley-Smith, M.C., M.E., B.Ch



I count it an honour to be asked to write a few words of congratulations to the Kigezi High School Jubilee Committee and to wish all success in the celebrations to remember the 50 years during which the school has played its part in the development of the Kigezi District.

When Dr. and Mrs. Sharp, my wife and I arrived in Kabale in 1921, we were fully occupied during the first year in settling in, starting the medical work, and helping in the spread of the work of evangelization throughout the District. So it was not till 1922 that it fell to my lot to make a start on the educational side of the work. The first step was to invite the Government Agents under Mr. Edward Kagubala, the chiefs and elders of Kigezi to propose to them the starting of a boarding school for boys. The plan met with their enthusiastic approval; and so on 2nd February, 1922 the school opened with eleven boys with a Muganda Master as their teacher.

On an occasion like this, as the School goes forward into its second half century, we look back, and we look forward, the backward look remembering all God's mercies to the school, the stream of young men who have gone out from it to serve Kigezi and all Uganda—and the forward look in reliance on God, with the prayer that the boys and girls of the school may, in the words of the Lord Jesus, seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and so be able to serve their country in the way that leads to true peace, progress and prosperity.

This is our prayer and hope for the Kigezi High School.

Fifty years back, selfless Christians started Kigezi High School as a Class Two Primary School to serve the limited needs of Kigezi District by training clerks and Muluka Chiefs. Since its inception the School has undergone considerable transformation in all fields, particularly academic. Thus from a Class Two Primary School to a full Junior Secondary School in 1946, and S1 to S4 Secondary School in 1965-68, and a Form 6 HSC Secondary School in 1969-70. During the fifty years of its existence, many boys and girls have gone through its gates and some of them have displayed special abilities in that they are Government Ministers, Bishops, doctors, engineers, lawyers and other professional situations.

Such products are evidence of the importance that the School attaches to the good grounding of its students academically and morally which are essential ingredients in public and private life.

As an old student I am proud to have gone through its gates where I benefitted academically and morally.

Lastly, as we celebrate the Golden Jubilee of our School I call upon all old and present students to spare no energy in fighting the economic war, and by so doing we will prove the worth of our institution in the society.

#### THE Section Two: **GENESIS**

Before 1922, the only kind of education that seems to have existed in Kigezi seems to have been some reading and writing conducted under the direct auspices of the District Commis sioner's Office. This was to enable the Administration to get some enlightened manpower. However, the facts are hazy and not very important to the history of the School.

Kigezi High School was started by the Church Missionary Society as an institution to promote one of "the three legs of the stool of mission." Kigezi High School was to be the Edu-


cation leg, the other legs being Medicine, and the Gospel of Christ.

At the beginning of 1922, the missionaries Dr. A. C. Stanley-Smith and Dr. L. Sharp, with the help of the District Commissioner, Mr. Adams, convened a meeting of the local Chiefs, and put across to them the idea of starting a boarding school for their sons. With the encouragement and persuasion of the District Government Agent Mr. Edward Kagubala, the Chiefs agreed to the proposal.


In February 1922 (actually the 'two-dominated' date of 2-2-22), the School was opened by the Provincial Commissioner, Mr. P. Cooper, and it can safely be said that it was the first school in the district. The Headmaster was Mr. Samwiri Sebuliba, a young Muganda.

Of the first students, Dr. Stanley-Smith has this to say: "The School started with eleven little boys, who arrived clad in skins, each trailing a goat, which was the original admission fee." Later in the year the number increased to twenty-four.


Friends and well-wishers of the School in Britain sent a gift of khaki shirts and shorts

# Section Three: FORMER HEADMASTERS

### SAMWIRI SEBULIBA (1922)


Sebuliba was a young man from Buganda who became Headmaster when the School opened in February 1922. For some reason he only served for a year, and then went back to NASENERI MATOVU (1923)

He succeeded Sebulibarand served for just a few months.

### KOSIYA SHALITA (1924)

Successor of Matovu. His period of Headmastership was also brief. He went on to follow a clerical calling that was justifiably crowned when he became Bishop of the Ankole/Kigezi

From 1960-65 he was again actively connected with the School, as Chairman of the Board of Governors. He has now left active service and we wish him a happy retirement.



# REV. JACK WARREN (1924-29)

This was the man sent by the Church Missionary Society as Headmaster, and he is in fact often referred to as the first Headmaster.

He gave the School the vitality of an institution. When the need arose for the School to be transferred to the site of the Primary School down in the valley, he was the one who undertook the job. His students say he had the interest of the School at heart. "He punished us like a parent, and one would be lucky to escape his cane," one of his students said with something near to nostalgia.

In 1927 he married on this hill, and met his death in 1929 back in Britain, at an unfortunately early age.

## REV. E. L. BARHAM (1929-30)

Although his period as Headmaster was short, he stayed on the hill and maintained close connection between School and Church.

When the Boys' Brigade was introduced in 1933, he became bandmaster. His memory of these events is still strong. Recently he wrote, "Your new Bishop, Festo Kivengere, was one of my

The pupils called him "Kemwenyera" for his ever-smiling mood. He founded the Canon Barham Divinity School, who are our neighbours. He is now a Bishop, and lives in Sussex, REV. P. J. BRAZIER (1930-31)

Rev. Brazier is remembered for his keenness at football. He would himself join in with the


When he ceased being Headmaster, he continued to work in the Rwanda Mission, and from , 1953-56 he was Chairman of the School Governors.



## REV. W. ORPWOOD (1931-35)

His most outstanding contribution was the introduction of the Boys' Brigade as the 1st Kigezi Company. This was in 1933. The B.B. band was a very useful magnet for attracting large crowds, giving the necessary congregation for preachers of the Gospel.

He was also popular with the local population, as he once shot dead a leopard that had become a menace to their life and property.



## REV. PHILIP TRIBE (1935-36)

Philip Tribe was very popular with his students and all progressive people. It was he who made it possible for many students to go to schools where they could get higher education. It is not surprising to look at the register and see that his students are what are known as "successful" people. He opened wider horizons for them-

He made a brief appearance here in 1970, and there was a lot of jubilation from his former students who

# REV. GREGORY-SMITH (1940)

He was Headmaster only for a short time, and concentrated his work on the supervision of schools. It was during his time that the School went up again to its present location, although it was smaller. 1960.

He was Secretary of the Board of Governors in the '50's, and acted as Chairman in



### JOHN BIKANGAGA (1941-8, and 1953-5)

Bikangaga is reserved, cool and introspective: almost a hermit. He inspires confidence and respect, though is almost a mystery man in his own way. Probably this is what gives him the personal charisma that is perhaps his greatest asset as a man. He is human, amiable, and always honest.

To many it is not strange that he came straight from Makerere to be Headmaster, and the first Old Boy Headmaster. No one has so far served longer as Headmaster of the School.

After 1948 he went to Britain for further studies, where he got a B.Sc. degree. In 1953 he came back and became Headmaster of his old school for another two years. Thereafter he briefly sat as a backbencher in the Legislative Assembly before becoming Headmaster of Makerere College School. In 1963 he took up the explosive job of Rutakirwa, a constitutional, semi-monarchical office, that cascad to be writh the

semi-monarchical office, that ceased to be with the coming of the Republican constitution. He was then appointed Chairman of the National Housing Corporation, a job he still holds. One of the School Houses is justly named after him.



#### IAN GATELY (1949-51)

Mr. Gately had a great interest in the expansion of the School library, and after writing to organisations back in Britain, he succeeded in expanding it considerably. He also invited funds to revive the Boys Brigade that was a great asset to Church and School.



### JOHN W. LWAMAFA (1951-53)

John Lwamafa has a confident look and walks with the full gait of a man of power. He has always worn a military moustache that declares the politically militant man in the hey-day of party politics.

He made a most worthy contribution to the name and prestige of the School in his teaching days when he was Gamesmaster.

He joined the Legislative Assembly as early as 1950, and had an uninterrupted career as a Parliamentarian until the 1971 January Coup, and was by then the oldest

member of the Assembly. Diligent and forceful on the rally-platform, he was eloquent and fluent when holding the floor of the House.

Before Independence he served as a Parliamentary Secretary of Education, and after Independence he was the Minister of Mineral and Water Resources, the Minister of Regional Administration, and finally the Minister of Health. He was one of only five Ministers who served continuously from 1962-1971—a manifestation of a man who has always done his work as it should be done. Another remarkable feature of his career is his ability to override opposition and never to fall.

It is indisputable that he has served Uganda longer and higher in the hierarchy of office than anyone else brought up in Kigezi and Kigezi High School.


#### MR. KARUMA (1956-58)

He held a South African B.Sc. degree. His students remember him as a teacher who walked in class without any reference books, for it was all in his head. He would pour out a stream of Biology and Geography. He is still in the Ministry of Education, and at one stage he taught at Namilyango College.



#### REV. R. E. LYTH (1960-63)

Richard Lyth had worked as an administrator in the Sudan before coming to Uganda. He could always tell where the schoolboys were likely to be hiding, smoking, or avoiding going to the compulsory Sunday morning service! After 1963 he served in the Christian Rural Service before he became the first Bishop of the Diocese of Kigezi. This was in 1967, and he stepped down in 1972. During this period he was Chairman of the Board of Governors, and in this time, this job was particularly demanding. He has now returned to the U.K., and we wish him a happy stay.



#### MR. Y. K. BUREGYEYA (1964)

Mr. Buregyeya had served as Acting Headmaster in 1959, and his later service saw the end of the Junior Secondary School system.

He was thoroughly uncompromising in what he considered bad, and certainly his standard of morality has always been high.

After 1964 he joined the Local Administration as Assistant Administrative Secretary, a job he still holds. He is one of the Governors of the School.

#### MR. Z. KABAZA (1965-69)

Holder of a Master's degree in History, Mr. Kabaza was a rigid but benevolent disciplinarian. He maintained Christian values, advocated Christian norms, and advanced a Christian morality, near to puritanism. He inspired very profound respect among the students, manifested in the degree of silence he commanded in the morning assemblies. Many students were interested in his exact and not very simple language.

For a long time in the 40's and 50's he taught at the School. After he left he briefly served as Headmaster of Kyambogo Demonstration School. Later he became an evangelist. We wish him happiness in his new career, that will certainly allow him a very fruitful exploitation of his high creditable talents.

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# Section Four: THE SCHOOL IN ITS INFANCY, 1922-42

The most outstanding feature of the days of infancy is the distinct contribution the pupils of that era have made since to the development of the district and the Nation. Obviously by virtue of their age they have had more time on the stage of life. Against that, however, must be set the limited opportunities of education they had. It was no wonder that you had a student who was in the middle of his primary education in 1930, graduating in 1952. The system did not permit a straight course of education. Besides, there was the possible lack of incentive from the fact that to go to school in those days could be of less apparent value than grazing father's herd of cattle. What of the demands of school discipline when youngsters of your age were exploiting the plentiful freedom of cattle-grazing or hunting? Pupils of that day seem to have been led by a providential destiny. A few names, indiscriminately selected, show the part played by these children (now old men) of destiny.

NASANI BWANKOSYA—of the pioneers—is little known outside Kigezi, but in current political terminology he could be called a radical nationalist. When he was knocked down and killed by a lorry in 1951 he was Saza Chief of Kinkizi. One wonders how many people ever ask themselves why there were never any Asian traders in Kinkizi. As early as the 1940's he saw what was to disturb the President in 1972.

REV. E. NYABAGABO after leaving Kigezi High School went to found Kinyansano High School, later to grow formidable.

Y. BIGOMBE, F. RWAMUNAHE and B. MBALINDA are another group of 1920's pupils who taught here in the 1930's. Later they actively served in the administration of the district. F. KITABURAZA also registered in the school in the late 20's, and is now a retired man after long service in Kigezi and later in the Central Administration.

In 1930, the School registered J. LWAMAFA and J. BIKANGAGA who were both to be Heads of the School at different times between 1940 and 1955. Along with Y. K. BUREGYEYA, who entered in 1934, they are the only Old Boy Headmasters the School has had.

DR. KANYARUTOKYE, a veteran of the medical profession, is also on the School register of this time.

Other names of the 30's include K. KIKIRA, once a teacher here, and then in the local Administration before he joined the Central Administration.

The incredibly widely-travelled evangelist, BISHOP F. KIVENGERE also entered in the mid-1930's. He taught here in the early 40's before he started an evangelical career, which has been rightly crowned by his becoming Bishop of Kigezi in December 1972. Kigezi High School unconsciously made her first Bishop in her year of Golden Jubilee.


FRANK KALIMUZO and M. MPAMBARA also reached high levels of service. JOSEPH BITWARI entered in the late 1930's. He was in active service in the district and later in the Nation, and is now retired.

1940, like the decade before, also brought into the School names which are now well-known. J. BYAGAGAIRE is an active Cabinet Minister in the Government of the Second Republic. E. N. BISAMUNYU is Director of Harbours in the E. A. Community. K. KAREGYESA as a Deputy-Minister of Animal Husbandry. K. H. KAKUYO is also well-known.

The phase of infancy closes with other well-known names such as SAM BAINGANA, F. BIJURENDA, E. BESIGYE. Of course, there are other people who do not expose themselves to

publicity, and their positions are well recognised. Some are doctors, others lawyers, and others businessmen. We thank them for having taken us far and wide.

At the close of this phase, the School changed physically, in that it moved uphill, and the two front blocks—opposite the present office and staff-room—were built, and opened in 1940 by the Governor, Sir Charles Dundas.







### Section Six: THE 1956-65 PERIOD

In 1955 the administration of the Primary part of the School was separated from that of the Secondary. So when one talks of K.H.S. after this time, one is really referring to the Secondary School, and this shortens the enrolment lists.

1956-65 was a period of academic performance never surpassed before or since. It it a fact that it was as difficult to join Senior One here as it was easy to leave it successfully for further pursuits. A great number of those boys became graduates and professionals, and we are grateful to them for keeping our name so high. One wonders what the standards would have been like had K.H.S. been granted Senior Secondary status sometime in the 50s. It is annoying that the School was only serving as a stepping-stone. This is of course the function of every institution, but the School long deserved to be more than a Junior Secondary. The result was that the School was robbed of some of its completeness because when Secondary Three was abolished, the Junior Secondary Certificate ceased to be a very presentable credential.



## Section Seven: SENIOR SECONDRY AND HIGHER




Senior Secondary Pioneers with their Class Teachers.

In 1965, the School came to Senior Secondary level. We had the good fortune to start Higher classes with the first sitting of the "O" levels—thus going from S1 to S6 in six years. Being of this level made the School more representative of the Nation, since it began to draw students from all over the country. As the level increased vertically, so too did the members, because the School was always being made to take more students by the Ministry of Education, sometimes almost beyond its capacity. This has brought the present enrolment to 600.

Inevitably we have come face to face with all the inherent challenges of rapid development. What happens is that when this occurs, the present tends to absorb all the energy at the expense of the future, and the future becomes unpredictable, and when it places its own challenges, they find everybody unprepared. The administration comes to find it difficult to reach the students at individual level, when a Headmaster and staff of 25 have to cater for the interests of 600. The tendency then is to concentrate on the immediate demands of the classroom and the student is almost left alone outside.

The School became mixed in 1966, and since then the number of girls has increased to about 120. Mixed schools have tended to remain something of an uneasy experiment throughout the country, and certainly experience with mixed boarding schools has not been very promising. In such schools the girls tend to prefer the boys to lead societies and clubs, to argue in





debates and on the School Council, and so on. The boys are not often very eager to allow girls fair play in the running of school affairs. The relative numbers of boys and girls does not help, and so on the whole, mixed schools have remained unmixed.

On the girls' side here, though, the Girl Guides have been very active, and the "Doves" won first prize at the national Kazi camp in tent construction.

As far as the "rapid development" problem is concerned, optimists see solutions. It is thought that a more carefully organised House system would eliminate many of the problems. Our Houses are small and therefore permit a useful substructure in the reaching of students by the staff. Unless students, especially those in the lower forms, are reached, there will always be irresponsibility, expressing itself in vandalism, unseemly shouting, provocative self-assertion and the like.

The greatest cure of all lies however in the re-directing of energy and outlook towards better examination performance. Academic success is above other things in bringing people to school. In our society academic success is even more stressed because passing exams is the way of getting into the next earning class. Whatever else a school has achieved, if it cannot get its students through their exams, it will be ruled out as a failure. Success will come as a result of the combination of individual hard work, and the provision of the necessary working facilities by the administration.

Many of us, optimists, see the future as a great asset which, within limits, we can manipulate into giving the School what it so far has not achieved. 1972 should see the end of all the vices, and 1973 should see an accelerated promotion of the known virtues, as well as the growth of new ones, in the spirit of "I Serve"—which implies that every student must attach the greatest importance to the shaping of his own destiny, and this in practical terms means hard work. "I Serve" also calls on all present and old students to devote ourselves the common destiny we share with the rest of our fellow citizens.

#### Notes about the present-day School

**Classes.** Today the S1-4 section is a triple-stream system, making twelve classes. S5 and 6 Higher classes are double stream, Arts and Science. Thus there are 16 classes altogether.

**Houses.** There are eight Houses: Aggrey, Bikangaga, Bishops, Bwankosya, Republic, Warren, Kilimanjaro and Uhuru. The old "mission house" is used by S6, who believe seclusion is the privilege of age.

Clubs and Societies. These include Debating, Current Affairs, Drama, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, Animal and Mountaineering, Chess, Scripture Union, Geographical, Scientific, Mathematical and Photographic.

**Buildings.** We were the largest scheme in the World Bank School Building Programme. It was a great day for the School when the President formally opened the new buildings on May 1, 1971.

**School Council.** This comprises members elected at form level, under a Chairman elected by the Council. The staff is also represented, and this type of arrangement has been quite successful compared to the previous Councils. The Council supervises the Food and Entertainment subcommittees.

**Sports and Games.** The School actively participates in local sports, mainly football, athletics, lawn tennis and basketball, and often does very well, particularly in football. Other sports include table tennis, netball, boxing, and cross-country.

**Farm and Bakery.** At the southern foot of the hill the School owns a farm that stocks cows, hens and pigs. The School also owns a bakery that produces bread for neighbouring schools as well.
